

FROM FATHER ALBERT

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is also known as Good Shepherd Sunday. On this day, the Church invites us to reflect on the beautiful image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, who cares for his flock with tender love and sacrifice.

As Pope John Paul II reminds us, this image of the Good Shepherd has deep roots in the Old Testament, where the prophets like Ezekiel spoke of God as the shepherd who gathers his scattered sheep, feeds them, and protects them. This prophetic vision finds its fulfillment in Jesus Christ, who declares, "I am the good shepherd".

The image of the Good Shepherd reveals the heart of God - a God who loves passionately, pursues relentlessly, and cares deeply for each and every person. As Pope John Paul II says, this is the "mystery of God's love for his sheep - his infinite, unchanging love."

The image of the Good Shepherd has been a powerful and comforting symbol for the Church from the earliest times, and it continues to strike and move the hearts of believers and non-believers alike.

In Jesus, we see the perfect embodiment of the Good Shepherd. He knows each of his sheep by name and cares for them with a love that knows no bounds.

The Good Shepherd's love is universal, extending beyond the boundaries of any one-fold. As Pope John Paul II explains, Jesus says, "I have other sheep that are not of this fold; I must bring them also, and they will heed my voice. So, there shall be one flock, one shepherd." The sacrifice of the Cross is meant to gather all people into the one flock of God's family.

My friends, the Good Shepherd is the one who calls us to follow him. He invites us to trust in his care, to listen to his voice, and to allow him to lead us to the "green pastures" and "still waters" of his abundant life. In the Eucharist, the Risen Good Shepherd continues to nourish us with his own Body and Blood, strengthening us for the journey ahead.

The Good Shepherd defends and protects his flock, even at the risk of his own life. The mission of the Good Shepherd continues in the Church through the apostles and their successors, the bishops and priests.

Let us, then, rejoice in the love of our Good Shepherd, who knows us intimately and lays down his life for us. May we strive to be good sheep, following faithfully in his footsteps, and bringing others to join his flock. For in him alone do we find true life and salvation.

In the Liturgy of the Church Helen Ackermann

With this Sunday's gospel we hear of the good shepherd. It is an image often depicted with Jesus carrying a lamb on his shoulders. We know this Jesus as the one who insists that his sheep will know him and that he will know his sheep. Jesus also indicates that he is concerned about those who are not of his fold. He wants to lay down his life for those as well. Jesus has come to bring salvation to all humanity.

In our relationship with Jesus as shepherd we come to know that we are to follow his way and hear his voice deep in our hearts. What might prevent us from doing that? If we search for an answer we might want to reread the second reading from the First Letter of John. Here we hear the words,"See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are." What might prevent us from hearing and understanding the good shepherd is our inability to truly believe we are beloved by God. When we focus only on our sinfulness, we cannot trust the love God has for us through his Son, Jesus Christ.

In reading a commentary on this week's readings from the booklet, Give Us This Day, I was struck with the comments by the author, Catherine de Hueck Doherty who says this, "The greatest tragedy of our world is that men and women do not know, really know that God loves them." Because of this, she indicates that people do not know how to love God back. Loving God through his son, Jesus Chris, t means that we are to hear his voice and follow his way. Following his way means we are to love others as he loved them ready to give our very selves for others. My experience is that I have known many people who have difficulty knowing that God loves us unconditionally. I think we might all have doubts about this love. For this reason, we need to hear over and over again that we are loved. Even our sinfulness which is a condition of human life cannot separate us from the love of God. During this Easter Season, that love prompts us to say, Alleluia. Alleluia.

We remember this week, George, martyr, Adalbert, bishop and martyr (Tuesday) Fidelis of Sigmaringen, priest, martyr, (Wednesday) Mark, the Evangelist (Thursday)

St. Mark, evangelist (first century)

On this day the 25th of April we celebrate St. Mark an evangelist and the one who is our patron as a parish. It is said that Mark was not an apostle. He was probably a member of one of the first Christian communities. His mother's house in Jerusalem is mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles as a center where Christians gathered. Mark was baptized by Peter. They moved to Rome where Mark acted as Peter's secretary. Mark also traveled with Paul. He wrote his account of the Gospel between AD 60 and 70. It is a simple and direct Gospel and was a source for

the other Gospels. He portrays the humanness of Jesus and indicates we should all go out and proclaim the good news to all.

SCRIPTURE TEXTS - April 28, 2024 Fifth Sunday of Easter

Opening Prayer: Lord God, help me to so firmly attached to your son, Jesus Christ. He is the vine and we are the branches. When our life flows from him we will find ourselves better able to bear much fruit. This fruit will bring others to believe in Jesus Christ, he who is lord forever and ever. Amen.

ACTS 9:26-31

When Saul arrived in Jerusalem he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him, not believing that he was a disciple. Then Barnabas took charge of him and brought him to the apostles, and he reported to them how he had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken to him, and how in Damascus he had spoken out boldly in the name of Jesus. He moved about freely with them in Jerusalem, and spoke out boldly in the name of the Lord. He also spoke and debated with the Hellenists, but they tried to kill him. And when the brothers learned of this, they took him down to Caesarea and sent him on his way to Tarsus.

The church throughout all Judea, Galilee, and Samaria was at peace. It was being built up and walked in the fear of the Lord, and with the consolation of the Holy Spirit it grew in numbers.

PSALM 22:26-27, 28, 30, 31-32

R. (26a) I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people.

I will fulfill my vows before those who fear the LORD. The lowly shall eat their fill; they who seek the LORD shall praise him: "May your hearts live forever!" R. I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people.

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD; all the families of the nations shall bow down before him. R. I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people.

To him alone shall bow down all who sleep in the earth; before him shall bend all who go down into the dust. R. I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people.

And to him my soul shall live; my descendants shall serve him. Let the coming generation be told of the LORD that they may proclaim to a people yet to be born the justice he has shown.

1 JOHN 3:18-24

Children, let us love not in word or speech but in deed and truth. Now this is how we shall know that we belong to the truth and reassure our hearts before him in whatever our hearts condemn, for God is greater than our hearts and knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence in God and receive from him whatever we ask, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him. And his commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as he commanded us. Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them, and the way we know that he remains in us is from the Spirit he gave us.

JOHN 15:1-8

Jesus said to his disciples: "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. He takes away every branch in me that does not bear fruit, and every one that does he prunes so that it bears more fruit. You are already pruned because of the word that I spoke to you. Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing. Anyone who does not remain in me will be thrown out like a branch and wither; people will gather them and throw them into a fire and they will be burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you. By this is my Father glorified, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

Reflection Questions:

1. Are things in your life that need pruning so that you can produce more fruit?

2. Are there times in your life that you realize needed pruning? How do you respond to the need to be pruned?

3. Does your prayer life enable you to discover those attitudes and ideas that need to be pruned?

4. Why is your relationship with God through Jesus so important if you are to bear good fruit?

Concluding Prayer: Lord God, I know that your Son Jesus Christ is the vine and we are the branches. Enable me to be pruned so that I can bear much fruit in his name, he who is Lord forever and ever. Amen

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
